The evening atmosphere will be filled with success and lots of winning smiles, a cocktail reception followed by pre-dinner conversation and the exchanges of business cards. Last year, as I mingled in the crowd, I quickly realized that no one was there by chance. Editors, publishers, writers, families, friends and their guests all represented some of the brightest and most devoted people in our profession. Listening and watching the crowd confirmed that innovation and competition were better than ever. The atmosphere was exciting and the evening developed into a captivating experience.

Finally, I would like to close with a brag. It has to do with a research project between me, Dr. Cindy Otto, who is Director of the Working Dog Center at the U. of Pennsylvania and two other researchers. Collectively we published an article entitled "An Internet-based survey of risk factors for surgical gastric dilatation-volvulus in dogs". This was a study about a dreaded disease called Bloat; it was published in the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association (JAVMA) on June 15, 2012. Bloat (GDV) affects many breeds. When it occurs in dogs, the stomach distends with air and then while dilated, twists. This action interferes with the blood supply to the stomach and other digestive organs, blocks the passage of food, causes the stomach to distend, impedes the return of

blood to the heart and results in reducing cardiac output. Blood and oxygen are deprived from a tissue which in turn causes them to die, releasing toxins into the blood stream which causes serious disturbances in heart rhythms and usually results in death unless treated. Our study uncovered more about the risk factors associated with bloat. The data showed there are personalityassociated factors, such as having a happy and easy-going temperament and that submissive behaviors were associated with a decreased risk for GDV. Dogs that were fearful or aggressive toward strangers were associated with an increased risk of GDV. A decreased risk for GDV was also found for dogs whose diets were supplemented with eggs or fish, and that feeding table scraps had no significant effect on this disorder. The published article has much more to say and should be of interest to owners and breeders. To learn more about our study, contact me at www.breedingbetterdogs.com. ## Dogwise and the Changing World of Dog Books

When we started selling books to dog fanciers in 1987 it was all about breed books. Breed books were what dog

book publishers produced, what people wanted, and what we sold. Sure, there were books on health, breeding, showing and training, but nothing like we see today. In the mid 1990s, the demand for quality dog books took off in new directions. Dog trainers began to organize and professionalize, wanting information based on the science of animal behavior. AKC registrations were at an all-time high, fueling demand for better information on breeding, conformation and structure. Dog sports grew beyond showing and competitive obedience with the introduction of Agility, Flyball and Rally. Even fiction writers got into the act entertaining us with dog-lovers' whodunits, and everyone embraced information about the human-animal bond and pets as therapy animals. A dog book seller's dream!

In 2000 things began to change again. We noticed it when books that had sold well for us began going out of print. OOPs. Why? One reason was that traditional dog book publishers were being taken over by large multi-line publishers more interested in best sellers (think *Marley and Me*) than serving dog enthusiasts. And while 'Out Of Print' usually means the end of the line for a book, it turned out to be an opportunity for Dogwise – and for authors. Where

once we had proudly described ourselves as 'Dog Book Retailers,' now, out of necessity, we morphed into 'Dog Book Publishers' to ensure our customers could continue to get the books they really wanted.

At first we simply reprinted out-of-print books such as Clarence Pfaffenberger's New Knowledge of Dog Behavior. Then we got brave and worked with authors to update their books and do second editions including Canine Massage and Therapy Dogs. From there we jumped in all the way and developed projects from scratch. The success we have had as a niche publisher has been gratifying but we continue to morph.

Now, in 2013, the challenge for authors and publishers comes from the Internet. From Dogwise's viewpoint books are being challenged by the immediate gratification of googling. Breed books in particular are threatened by technology that gives the curious hundreds and thousands of photos at their fingertips plus solid (when coming from reliable sources) info on breed size, temperament and care. Luckily for dog book writers and publishers, there's always something new coming along about dogs. The challenge is to identify that topic and get writing!

Recently, Patti Moran, president and founder of Pet Sitters International and DWAA member, sat down for a one-on-one interview designed specifically for *Ruff Drafts* in order to share her insights about pet sitting, the industry as a whole and how she got started in the business.

#### Kitsy: What inspired you to become a pet sitter?

**Patti:** My own dogs! I realized there had to be a better way of providing care for them when as a pet owner I couldn't. My husband and I were taking a two-week trip and had to find somewhere to leave our dogs. They were used to being out in the country, in their own space. Kennels are just not the right option for every dog and not an option at all for some pets like fish or birds.

## Kitsy: What did you love most about pet-sitting as a career?

**Patti:** I liked the freedom of being my own boss and setting my own schedule and also the immediate gratification from the pets that were always glad to see me.

Fun Fact: In her first year as a pet sitter, Patti and her partner began adding new staff members within six

months in order to handle all of their clients. In addition to cats and dogs, she also cared for rabbits, a turtle or two, several parakeets and parrots, a goat and a few aquariums.

## Kitsy: What was your biggest challenge as a professional pet sitter?

**Patti:** People thought I was crazy. There was a lot of skepticism about pet sitting as a career as it was practically unheard of when I started in 1983. I had to introduce the concept; it was quite a learning curve. Today's pet sitters aren't considered as crazy, but they still have to sell themselves!

Fun Fact: The word pet sitter was not found in the dictionary until 1997. Keep reading to find out who campaigned to have the word added!

## Kitsy: What prompted you to transition from your own pet-sitting business to creating an association for pet sitters?

**Patti:** The belief in my passion that pet sitting was a service whose time had come. After I wrote the book *Pet Sitting for Profit*, I started getting a lot of calls from other people, mainly other women, who were trying to start their own businesses and wanted my help and advice. I realized I couldn't do it all. I had to make a choice so I decided to help other people find the resources they needed to start their pet-sitting businesses, which in turn would provide more care for even more pets!

Fun Fact: Pet sitting is still a female-dominated industry and 91.3 percent of PSI members are female. In 2007 Patti received the "Women in Business Award" from The Winston-Salem Business Journal.

## Kitsy: What do you love most about leading an international pet-sitting association?

**Patti:** I have had the opportunity to meet, know and work with the nicest people over the years. Most of the time, if people love pets, they're good people.

## Kitsy: What is your biggest challenge in leading a world-wide association?

**Patti:** Keeping pet sitters on the cutting edge of technology and staying ahead of the competition.

Fun Fact: Patti still gets her motivation from a quote her Mother often recited to her, "If at once you have begun, never leave it 'til it's done. Be it big or be it small, do it well or not at all."

## Kitsy: What are the biggest changes in the industry of in-home pet care that you have witnessed over the years?

**Patti:** Technology has really advanced the level of professionalism in the industry. And, we are also starting to see more male pet sitters now that it is a more established industry.

Fun Fact: Seventy-four percent of PSI members have or plan to have a company Web site and 68 percent use or plan to use social media to help market their businesses.

Kitsy: As a pioneer of the pet-sitting industry you have created the largest association for professional pet sitters, the first professional Pet Sitter of the Year™ award, Take Your Dog to Work Day® and more. What accomplishment are you most proud of?

**Patti:** Take Your Dog To Work Day is near and dear to my heart, as is the Pet Sitter of the Year Award and PSI's Certification Program, but I am probably most proud of getting the word "petsitter" listed in the dictionary. One day I looked it up and realized it was not in the dictionary and I thought, "Well, no wonder people don't know what we are; we aren't in the dictionary." It was a very long process, but in 1997 Random House finally included the word pet sitter in the dictionary. I am very proud of creating something that became recognized as a word and I'm lucky to have had the help that I have had over the years. I haven't done this alone.

#### Kitsy: What are your future goals for PSI?

**Patti:** We're going to continue with the same vision and mission that PSI was founded upon – to support, promote and recognize excellence in pet sitting. Our focus on education will help set our members apart with the high standards and professionalism that the public deserves when securing in-home pet care. Providing our members with an exemplary Certification Program and professional credentials is an important part of our future.

## Kitsy: What do you recommend for pet sitters who are looking to succeed in this field in 2013?

**Patti:** I think that continuing education is paramount in this profession because you can never know it all. Each pet, each client and each day is different and anything can happen. I think learning all you can from the resources we have available in the Certification Program, Pet Sitter's WORLD articles and tips and advice from other pet sitters on the Member Forum is the most valuable part of PSI.

## Kitsy: Now we have some "just for fun" questions. Stories from pet sitters about unusual client requests are always a popular topic. What unusual client requests did you receive as a pet sitter?

**Patti:** My unusual requests seem very tame now compared to those our members submit, but mainly I received requests for special meals to be prepared for the pets. I did have a Maine coon cat that was to be walked on a leather leash in his English garden after dinner to play in his catnip. I do enjoy living vicariously through the many entertaining stories our members send in about their unusual requests.

Fun fact: Patti has four dogs, Sookie, Jilly, Bella and Henry, and two cats, Bernie and Cleo.

#### Kitsy: What do you like to do for fun with your pets?

**Patti:** I **love** to ride around the hacienda with them in our golf cart. We live out in the country and after we acquired a golf cart some years ago, the dogs quickly learned to love riding in it. It's always been a way to relax for me... tooling around with them loaded up!

aving belonged to DWAA between 1992 and 2005, I'm not really a "new" member. I dropped my membership when I stopped writing for publication in order to have more time available to look after my father's needs. In May 2000, he cardiac arrested after brain surgery for a subdural hematoma. Although he was resuscitated and spent six weeks in rehab, he never fully recov-

ered. I spent much of his remaining seven years accompanying him on ambulance trips back to the Emergency Room and battling nursing home staff over the quality of his care. I didn't begin writing again until after he passed away.

Like many others I suspect, I was "led" to dog writing by a dog. In my case, a two-year-old Australian Cattle Dog came into my life in 1984. He presented behavioral challenges unlike any of the other dogs I'd owned previously. The struggle to turn him into a manageable canine companion was the basis for the first article I had published.

I've been a *Dog News* Contributing Editor since December 2010. I was a *Dog World* Contributing Editor between 1991 and 2003. My articles also appeared in *Dog Fancy, Dogs In Canada, Animal Wellness, The Bark, Good Dog, Poodle Variety,* and *Poodle Review* among others. I wrote the Paw Print pet column for a local newspaper as well.

I suspect there is much more improving yet to come. So how did I get here? It was a combination of serendipity and sheer dumb luck. I was lucky to meet great people who helped me."



our contest chair in Kentucky is declaring the 2012 DWAA competition a huge success, with 438 regular entries and another 219 special award contenders from all over the U.S., Canada, the U.K., and places as far away as New Zealand and Sweden! The judges were enthusiastic, for the most part, and scored many entries so high that we ended up with 150 nominees in 41 categories.

The fluctuation in publishing processes is causing massive swings in the industry, and we're seeing declines (and demises) in many printed products and a huge increase in everything digital.

Instead of the original 43 categories, we ended up with 41. Several categories (B3 & 4, F24 & 25, and G28 and 29) were combined, and one (B8) was split into two parts.

Entry breakdowns are as follows:

- A. Newspaper features & columns 30
- B. Magazines (incl. features and columns) 93
- C. Canine Newsletters (incl. features) 15
- D. Internet Magazines, Features, Websites, Blogs 98
- E. Graphics 45
- F. Humor, Poetry, Short Fiction, Op/Eds 41
- G. Other Media 18
- H. Club Pubs (incl. features and columns) 52
- I. Books 46

You'll note some sub-categories have just a couple of nominations. This does not mean there were only a couple of entries . . . just that there were only a couple of entries that were deserving. On the other hand, some sub-categories were so laden with quality that we could have awarded many more nominations.

We'll be looking for ways to further refine the contest next year, so look for some dramatic changes. In the meantime, let's celebrate the abundance of talent in our sport and support each other as we continue our efforts on every front, for the sake of our dogs.
