

The focus is on providing a ringside experience with analysis and commentary on all things doggy. Billy was one of the original contributors to Best in Show Daily, penning his Back Story column from December of 2011 through July of 2013. Currently, Billy is dedicating all his free time to DSP, hoping to make new converts to the world of purebred dogs.

After 25 years of living in New York, San Francisco, and Washington DC, Billy is living in his hometown of Memphis, Tennessee with his wife of 43 years, Brenda. Steven D. Wolf

Better known as Wolf, Steven was a founding partner of Hauptman, O'Brien, Wolf and Lathrop, P.C., an Omaha law firm specializing in products liability and personal injury. Because of a severe health problem, Wolf reluctantly left his job and family in 2000 and moved to Arizona for its warm winter climate.

There, he is drawn to a local group that rescues abused racing greyhounds. Though he can just barely take care of himself because of a spinal condition, Wolf adopts Comet, an elegant cinnamon-striped racer. Or is it Comet who adopts Wolf?

Racers, exposed only to the track and cage, have no experience with the most basic everyday skills, such as walking on tile floors and climbing stairs, so Wolf must show Comet how to lead a normal dog's life. Gradually, a confident and mysterious spirit emerges from the stunning animal. And when Wolf's health and mood sharply decline, the tables turn.

Now he can no longer perform basic everyday skills, such as climbing stairs and grocery shopping, and Comet must help. In Comet's Tale, we follow their journey as Wolf teaches Comet to be a service dog. Soon she is towing shopping carts down food store aisles, opening doors for Wolf, and even pulling off Wolf's blankets, insisting he get out of bed, stop moaning, and take a walk! Comet attracts new friends to Wolf's isolated world, and, finally, she plays a crucial role in restoring his health, saving his marriage, and broadening his definition of success.

As inspiring as it is entertaining, Comet's Tale leaves us all with a deeper understanding of the extraordinary kinship between man and dog. As Kirkus Reviews put it, "The close bond between man and dog is only part of this absorbing tale of love, family and dealing with disability ... A heart-warming story that will hold appeal far beyond just animal lovers."

Comet was recognized as Service Dog of the Year 2010 by the Nebraska Humane Society.



Hudson News recognized the book as a Top Ten Nonfiction selection for 2012. Shelf Awareness also chose Comet's Tale as a Top Ten Pick for 2012.

Wolf is now an active sponsor of the Humane Society and an active participant and sponsor of greyhound education through various rescue and advocacy groups throughout the United States. He currently divides his time between Omaha, Nebraska and Sedona, Arizona.

Celeste Yarnall, Ph.D

Celeste is an author, film producer, speaker and actress, whose career, in both film and television, spans five decades. She is best known for her guest-starring role in the original Star Trek episode entitled. The Apple, and as Elvis Presley's co-star in "Live a Little, Love a Little." Celeste's first love was a Collie dog named Lonnie, whom she bred with Lassie #7 and raised a litter of beautiful Lassie puppies. She also trained and showed Lonnie in obedience and conformation. Celeste considers it an honor to have had a Collie by her side for most of her adult life.

One of Celeste's proudest achievements is raising 11 generations of Tonkinese championship show cats, who for many years lived happily with one of her Collies - all were reared on the holistic diet, lifestyle and principles outlined in her books.

Celeste's company, Celestial Pets, offers clinical nutrition holistic

life coaching and consultation services, along with their own line of all natural, human grade supplements and "mix ins" called Celestial Pets as well as other anti-aging and holistic alternatives for both pets and people.

Mary Bloom exhibit at the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in New York City. It's the largest Cathedral in the world, a very beautiful building, and very dog friendly.

Mary's latest exhibit, titled "Dog Bless You," will be hanging until the end of January. It contains a slide show with 150 dog images and another with 240 from my days at the Cathedral. That display is at the front of the Cathedral as you enter the main doors. Further down the nave, hanging on two photo walls, are 72 framed photos of dogs. The response has been very positive as the visitors are surprised to see so many dogs in such a sacred space.

The Photography of Mary Bloom

Mary Bloom has been a photographer specializing in dogs and their importance in our lives since 1978. The first time Mary Bloom, Cathedral Photographer in Residence for two decades, had a show of her photographs at the Cathedral (1980), she saw herself as a neophyte photographer, a recent escapee from the corporate world, wanting to change her life. Her show was called "Animals, Their Uses and Abuses," and documented her work with the ASPCA, which included photographing protests against the clubbing of baby harp seals on Canadian ice floes (pictures that made newspaper front pages around the world). Bloom was the only woman photographer assigned to photograph the harp seal hunt off the coast of Newfoundland, and the grey seal hunt off the coast of Scotland.

Bloom has always worked with and for animals, from seals to the wolves that were once fashionable as Manhattan pets, to dogs, cats, skunks, birds, monkeys and many others. In the early days of planning for the first St. Francis Day Blessing of the Animals,

Cathedral Director of Communications Paul Gorman told her, "You have to get involved. They've got great ideas, but they don't know anything about animals." She went to the next planning meeting and was part of the committee until she left the Cathedral in 2002.

As Cathedral photographer, Bloom covered every aspect of life at the Cathedral, taking pictures of events great and small, and providing all the images for the newsletter. She depicted the grandeur of holiday services and consecrations, and small human moments. She made portraits of the Dalai Lama and Desmond Tutu, and portraits of peacocks and elephants.



She also volunteered at the Soup Kitchen, cooking meals and raising funds for kitchen appliances. She's responsible for the Cathedral's current peacock trio: Harry, Phil and Jim, whom she found at a Pennsylvania breeder and raised in her kitchen for several weeks, letting the chicks get used to human handling.


Bloom is passionate about the Cathedral and

the relationships she formed here. "Being at the Cathedral gave me a life. I had no training, was just starting out, and I joined this great community. That's what it was all about, working with other artists... and we all did something in the world to help that was important; it wasn't just about being artists. It was a spiritual journey... you know, you leave something that was good and know you're going on to something else good ... but then you look back and say, 'That was the best time.' "

Bloom is the recipient of the Dog Writers Association of America Distinguished Service Award both in February 2001 and again in 2009, and will be introduced into the Dog Writer's Hall of Fame in 2014. She has illustrated over 40 dog books for numerous publishers, and was the inspiration for two children's books by the author Aliki, titled At Mary Bloom's and Overnight at Mary Bloom's, Greenwillow, New York, 1987. Her photographs have appeared in numerous publications including Life, People, and Smithsonian Magazine.

Most of Bloom's time is spent helping animals and photographing dogs. She's was appointed as the official photographer of the Westminster Kennel Club in 1995.

Mary lives 100 miles north of New York City in the Hudson Valley with a Cardigan Welsh Corgi and three cats. Her pictures vibrate with personality and love. The beauty of the animal is there, but more important is the absolute statement of unique individual life.

From the tiniest teacup poodle to the most massive Great Dane, dogs' digestive systems are pure wolf. Fido's ancestors enjoyed a diet that was 45 to 50 percent protein, 40 to 50 percent fat, and less than 10 percent carbohydrates. Walk down the pet food aisle, however, and you'll find that typical commercial kibble is made mainly of starchy ingredients like peas, potatoes, corn, wheat, rice, and oats - nothing a prehistoric pup would dream of eating. This "healthy" mix is proving anything but: About 85 percent of dogs eat commercial dog food, and at least half of them are overweight or obese, with cancer killing 42 percent of all dogs and half of dogs over the age of 10.


