My debut in this world was on December 20, 1934 in Milford, Massachusetts. Shortly thereafter, we moved to Providence, Rhode Island, where I grew up. Because my mother got a job when I was five, I was free to roam the city with my caregiver dog, Flippy. He came to us in 1937. Flippy protected me from a gang of girls bent on "whupping my ass" when I was six. Sadly, Flippy died protecting me from a huge German Shepherd.

After living in the Maine wilderness with my first husband, I moved back to Providence when my first baby was born. Eventually, I got my PhD in Linguistics. Animal communication and thought are part of a Linguist's repertoire. Although I wrote books and articles on sociology of language and psychotic speech, I also kept up with the scholarship of animal cognition, including that of dogs. Through it all, I always had dogs.

When I retired from my professorship, I decided to devote myself to the explosion of current research into dogs. For the past seven years, I studied dogs intensively, and then wrote my seventh book, <u>Humans, Dogs, and Civilization</u>. Based on cutting edge science, this book also tells anecdotes that prove the results of dog studies. Besides

being a scientific study of dogs, the book is memoir of 77 years of the dogs in my life.

My book can be ordered as an eBook or a paperback. The eBook is available on Nook, Kobo, Kindle, iBook and all other platforms. The paperback is available from Barnes & Noble and Amazon and can be ordered from independent bookstores.



A dog's nose, which is many times more sensitive than a human's, can sniff out fluctuations in body chemistry that signal serious changes in a person's state of


health such as diabetes.

Humans, Dogs, and Civilization

by Elaine Ostrach Chaika illustrated by Janet Croog

I am a scholar and have written several scholarly articles, chapters in other people's edited books; and I've also written six other books, however, the dog book is my first book written for a general audience. For instance, there are chapters on whether dogs think, have extrasensory perception, how they evolved and if they're wolves. In each chapter, I tell about dogs I've had since childhood to prove or disprove a point, so the book is also a memoir. The Prologue starts with what my dog did when a gang of kids chased me home with the intent of "whupping my ass." That was 75 years ago. Since I have a doctorate in Linguistics, I also delve into how dogs communicate with each other by eye gaze. They can convey starting complex messages to them.

Alex Austin, the author of Nakamura Reality, called Humans, Dogs, and Civilization, "An enthralling blend of science and anecdote." Thirty-two illustrated chapters recount the latest cutting-edge science about dogs, as well as true stories about actual dogs. The book is partly a memoir, a scientific work, and an "engaging" narrative.

Kirkus Reviews called it "persuasive and engaging . . . a must read for anyone interested in the long history of dogs and people."

The book shows that dogs are not directly descended from wolves, that early humans didn't tame wolves to be dogs, that dogs partnered with Stone Age hunters of their own volition, and that dogs co-evolved with people. In fact, both dogs and humans have special receptors in their brains to allow them to communicate with each other. The human brain has shrunk 10%

since dogs domesticated themselves. T h a t 's because we

relied on the dog's superior senses of vision and scent, so that our brains no longer had to have space for such senses. Instead, the human brain became fashioned for complex speech, thought, and the arts. Since dogs became companions for humans, homo sapiens has become homo sapiens sapiens. That is, our own species has become more intelligent, although more deprived of acute senses. The book shows that civilization could never have been built by humans until dogs provided enough food through herding so that people no longer had to be nomads following herds of prey animals. There would be no Beethoven, rock 'n roll, Rembrandt, opera, symphonies, or scientists if dogs hadn't taken care of early humans.

It is available as an eBook on all platforms: Nook, Kindle, Kobo, etc. and also as a paperback from Barnes and Noble, Amazon, and can be ordered at independent bookstores as it is available from Ingram and other distributors. From Lisa Begin-Kryusman: The Animal History Museum is working with me on an on-line exhibit centered on the writing of Will Judy and National Dog Week with the potential for a physical exhibit at a later date.

As the automotive industry evolved in America so did the nation's dog population. In his numerous editions of Training the Dog, beginning in 1927, Will Judy, Founder of National Dog Week, and publisher of the venerable Dog World Magazine, educated automobile drivers on how to safely accommodate man's best friend from behind the wheel. He urged them not to allow their dogs to put their furry faces out of a moving car's window or ride on the hood of a car or its running board!

Long before Judy's advice to dog-owning drivers, however, New Jersey industrialist Harriet White Fisher embarked on a thirteen-month-long motoring journey that found her traversing four continents in a Locomobile with a Boston bull terrier named Honk Honk at her side. Honkie, as he was affectionately called, was only six weeks old when he was acquired by Harriet in Boston as a mascot for the global trip, gifted to her by the Locomobile Company.

Harriet, an avid animal lover, was smitten by the idea of a canine companion accompanying her on this history-making trek despite the concerns of those who feared the little dog would not survive such an ordeal.

On July 17, 1909, Harriet and her entourage - comprised of Maria, her personal maid; Albert, her man servant; and Harold Brooks, her driver - left Trenton, New Jersey for New York City. There, the Locomobile was transported overseas to Paris where their international journey would officially begin. All went as planned until they arrived in Genoa, Italy, only to be informed that Honkie could not sail onboard with Harriet's party. Declaring that, "Honk Honk must not be forgotten!" she sullenly resigned herself and composed a letter that lovingly detailed Honkie's care during his solo journey on another ship.

Harriet and Honkie were reunited in India, and the little dog survived his three-month long voyage through the jungles and palaces of the most remote regions. He survived encounters with wild animals, some humans with bad intentions, and over-feeding by his doting royal hosts.

Sailing for Japan, Harriet was once again informed of the ship's "no dogs allowed" policy. Honkie was again left in the care of a ship's captain and crew. Wherever he went he was so loved by his caretakers, and by a family who temporarily housed him in Kobe that Harriet genuinely feared there were times he would not be returned to her.

Traveling without Honk Honk in Sri Lanka (then Ceylon), a now pet-less Harriet fell in love with a little monkey she spotted playing among tea bushes on Sir Thomas Lipton's plantation, and welcomed him aboard. She named him Billikins and later introduced him to Honkie in Japan.

But that wasn't to be the final non-human crew

member to join Harriet's party. Before setting sail for her return to the United States, Harriet was presented with a Japanese Chin dog by members of the adoring Japanese Press. According to the American Kennel Club (AKC) this breed is "kept in the hands of the nobility and frequently given as gifts of esteem to diplomats and to foreigners who rendered some outstanding service to Japan."

But not without incident.

While trying to leave the ship in San Francisco, it was discovered that Harriet could not produce the required documents for bringing her pets ashore. Harriet unleashed a newsworthy tirade that was reported in detail in the San Francisco Call the following day. But rest assured, Harriet and her pets made it safely home and lived out their lives comfortably on her farm, Bella Vista, in Ewing, New Jersey.

Recently, I joined forces with a terrific Literary Agent in New York City who is now representing my proposal for a children's series based on these adorable traveling pets. We believe that dogs, and all animals, can motivate students to grow their knowledge of social studies, geography and of course, history!

Ranny Green • Past DWAA President, discussing being creative with one's abilities in today's tight freelancing market.


Mara Bovsun • AKC's Family Dog editor, describing how to use meetups and media to promote projects and as a way to gather information on specific topics.

Eligibility

- The contest is open to all writers, editors, publishers, photographers, artists and others whose work falls into the designated competition categories.
- Members and non-members may apply.
- Member fees accepted for members in good standing by May 1, 2015.
- Only original work published during the competition period from September 1, 2014 through August 31, 2015 will be accepted.
- Reprints, revisions, updates of previously published work are not eligible.
- An entry may be submitted in only one category.
 Exception: A book containing art may be submitted in a book category and in one or more art categories and requires two or more entry fees.
- Magazines, newsletters and blogs must be published at least quarterly.
- Submissions begin July 1, 2015. The contest closes August 31, 2015.
- All entries must be postmarked or submitted online no later than Wednesday, September 9, 2015.

- DWAA maximum liability is limited to refund of the entry fee.
- If the work is entered in the wrong category, DWAA reserves the right to make the correction, at the discretion of the Contest Chair, upon notification to entrant.
- Entries may be made on behalf of someone else, but the name
 of the person creating the work must be listed as the entrant.
 The entrant's and submitter's address and contact information
 are required.
- All names and contact information of co-creators are required.

Judging and Awards information

- A panel of three judges scores each entry. Judges consist of DWAA members and non-members who are professional writers and editors. A composite of judges' scores determine the nominees and winners. Judges may enter the contest, but will not judge entries categories they enter.
- Judges' decisions are final. A list of judges will be posted August 15, 2015.
- Nominees will be notified after December 1, 2015, and posted to the website beginning December 15, 2015.
- Winners will be announced at the DWAA Awards Banquet held in New York City, on Sunday February 14, 2015.
- Nominees in the regular and special categories receive certificates. Winners of regular categories receive the DWAA Maxwell Medallion, named in honor of the late Maxwell Riddle. Winners of special categories receive cash awards as listed.


