Several months ago, I asked people to search their memories for people who had served as President of DWAA in the past. I received a treasure of articles in the mail a few days ago from Barbara Kolk, the AKC librarian. Not only had she catalogued several Presidents Emeriti for me, but the articles contained some interesting data about DWAA.

Members who have read the information about DWAA on the website, in various articles or even the application brochure know that DWAA (at that time just DWA, the "of America" was added in '55) was formed by journalists who wrote about dogs in newspapers. It would still be a mighty small group if we had only newspaper journalists, as they seem to be an endangered species. In 1938, membership consisted of 34 canine couriers. We have grown to about 500 members. Thankfully, membership has been opened to any published writer on the subject of dogs. (Although there are many who don't read the application and who cause our Secretary a great deal of backtracking to obtain the three published pieces, now printed in bold on our website!) We now have editors, publishers, photographers, newsletter writers and more in addition to the workaday journalists.

In the material, I also found so many magazines that, sadly, no longer exist, at least to my knowledge: Dog Lovers Digest, Kennel Review, and Popular Dogs, among others.

Originally, the dinner and meeting were held together (Popular Dogs, March 1940). The awards began in 1951, according to Popular Dogs. There were four awards in 1952. We've grown to 50 categories at the present. Our honored and prolific Maxwell Riddle cleaned up in several categories for many years. The first recipient of the "yearly award for that member whose efforts have done the most for dogs" went to C. E. Harbison, who was secretary-treasurer for many years.

When I began attending in 1986, we had NO (that's right zero) monetary awards. We now have 14, totaling \$7500.00! In 1961, two(!) judges judged the entire contest! Now we have three judges for each category and another for the Special Awards, a total of about 135 this year. Disclaimer: If any of these stats are wrong, it's because they were wrong in the articles I was sent.

Once upon a time, we had speakers at our annual banquet. (Actually one article in Dog World told of Lina Basquette giving a monologue, dancing "plus cheesecake" (hmmmm). It also told of Evelyn Monte, the President, singing a "ditty." Please <u>don't</u> ask me to sing. And Jack Downing and Margaret Jones put on two or three acts.) In fact, I remember the first one I attended in 1986 had a speaker. We now have so many award categories we can no longer afford the luxury of the time it takes to have a speaker. Many people rise at the crack of dawn the following day to begin their duties at the Westminster show.

Since I've been attending, we've been through a flux of dinner sites. Although most were fun and served great meals, we've had problems with having enough seating, room to reach the podium, acoustical problems, lack of wheelchair access, and a dearth of taxis when we finish. The Southgate has been the "home" of our dinners for the past several years, which allows us to have more people attend the banquet and room to reach the front of the room to receive awards, as well as easy access to our rooms.

For many years we enjoyed the hospitality of Quaker/Ken-L-Ration/Heinz/Nature's Recipe.at our hospitality suite in the Southgate. Tom and Edie O'Shea (and eventually Katie, their daughter) were our host and hostess(es) with the mostest. Boy, was that great food and fun. But, like so many other things, this grew like Topsy and became impossible to continue.



2003 DWAA Writing Contest

Hopefully, by the time you read this, all the awards will have been handed out, the special awards checks passed on to talented winners, and everyone will have had a great time at the banquet. The 2003 contest will be completed.

The 2003 contest had over 800 entries total in the regular categories and special awards. The largest entries were in feature article in all breed and in single breed magazines with between 60 and 80 entries each. Regular column categories were also huge. The largest special award entries were the Merial, HSUS and ASPCA special awards with between 60 and 80 entries each. The smallest categories were Internet feature and column, poetry, short fiction, and books under 100 pages. Some of these had 1 to 5 entries. The smallest special awards included the junior writer award, the freestyle award, and both training awards.

There were three judges per regular category. In most cases I assigned one expert in that subject or area; one writer, editor, writing teacher, or publisher; and one dog person. I felt this made the judging about as fair as I could make it. The three scores were then averaged and the highest score became the winner.

For the most part, the judges' comments were very favorable. Interestingly enough, the larger the category, generally the more favorable the comments. The smaller the category, the less favorable the comments. Perhaps the greater variety of work made finding 'that special work' more likely. Several judges who were assigned books said that the increasing popularity of 'generic' type or 'formula' books seems to have stifled creativity or has made too many books too much alike. Interesting thought.

Planet Dog (<u>www.planetdog.com</u>) was kind enough to ship two very heavy boxes to me during the contest. The boxes contained Orbee balls (The world's best dog ball!) for our contest judges. My dogs go nuts over Orbees and several judges found their dogs were just as excited. Planet Dog has a variety of unique items - both useful and for gifts - and they also donate 10% of their profits to Planet Dog Philanthropy. Please check out their website and tell them thanks for helping our contest.

Our other special award sponsors include the AKC, Howell Book House, Iams, ASPCA, HSUS, Merial, WCFO, Off Lead, Radio Systems/Pet Safe, DogRead, and Pedigree. Please, when you do business with them, tell these businesses, "Thanks!"

I will be taking a break for a few months before thinking about the 2004 contest; the last year that I have volunteered to do. However, a couple of suggestions will probably be implemented for the 2004 contest. A couple of people have called for the judges to be listed for the contest and I will implement that. When judges volunteer for the job, I will ask for their permission to be named. If they agree, I will list their name. If they prefer to remain private, I will honor that. Unfortunately, there have been problems in the past with judges being harassed by contest entrants so I want to keep that option open. If future contest chairs wish to list all judges, regardless, that's up to them. I want to protect our judges from harassment if I can.

Someone else has asked if we can add a humor category. This could include cartoon, comic strips, haiku, short stories and other expressions of canine humor. I think this is worth offering at least once to see what kind of response we get. So get that humor published now so it can be included in the 2004 contest!

The 2004 contest rules and categories should be up on the DWAA website by June or July, and will be in the newsletter shortly thereafter. So look for it then. Meanwhile, I am going to take a break from any contest thoughts and catch up on my work!

DWAA 2003 Writing Contest Winners

Each entry in each category is scrutinized by three judges. Each judge scores the entries from 100 (perfect) to 0. The three scores are averaged to come up with one score. The highest scoring entries in each category are the nominees and the highest score is the Maxwell Award winner. The number of nominees depends upon the judges' scores. Any entry that has an over all low score will not be nominated.

General DWAA Meeting Minutes, February 8, 2004

14 Members and two guests present. Chris Walkowicz thanked, Pat, Liz Palika, Susan McCullough, Maggie Bonham, Phyllis DeGioia, Alan Alford, Mordecai Siegal and Kathy Buetow for all their help this past year. Chris called for a moment of silence for Nigel Aubrey Jones and Elizabeth Crosby Simpson.

Deb Eldredge and David Frei are now DWAA board members.

Committee Reports

Secretary Report: We have 496 members at this time. We have lost several members that are not writing any longer. Elaine Gewirtz will be helping with sending out applications for membership to different publications. This should bring in more new members. We have processed 30 applications this past year. We returned 5 that had no writings with them and 3 of them generated writings and joined. We have several people who are in the process of writing for local newsletters and then will apply. The best story is the 80-year-old man who wrote a 3-line poem to his dead dog and published it in a local newsletter. He asked if that would qualify him for membership. The cutest was the young girl needing help writing a school paper about dogs. She does not have a dog of her own, but plays with a neighbor's dog because he needs her. She let me know she got an A on her paper. The Web site generates the most applications today and now with a new web site coming it should even be more positive.

If someone is ill or needs a card to cheer them up, let Pat Santi know and she will send them a note from DWAA. Please try to let her know about your changes of address and e-mail.

Treasurer Report: Alan has the books at the Audit. Jan Mahood just received them.

Contest Report: This year's contest went relatively smoothly. There were fewer regular category entries but more special award entries: total entries 800. Several categories had very small entries; a couple as few as one entry. The smallest categories overall were the Internet categories. Newspaper categories also continue to be very small. The largest categories continue to be features and columns for all breed and single breed magazines-between 60 to 80 entries in each. The largest special award categories included Merial, HSUS and ASPCA special awards with between 60-80 for each of them. The smallest entries for special awards were for the two training awards. Three judges were assigned to each regular category and one to each special award category. Judges included dog experts, breeders, conformation judges, trainers, obedience judges, writers, publishers, editors, college writing professors/teachers and veterinarians. The names of this year's judges were not released as permission to do so was not requested of the judges at the

time they volunteered; however, due to requests for this information, that permission will be solicited for the 2004 contest.

Several judges made comments on the quality of the work being judged and comments ranged from 'awesome' to 'poor.' Those judging larger categories obviously had more work to look at and the comments were generally more positive. Those judging smaller categories tended to have less positive comments.

Liz has volunteered to chair the contest one last year for the 2004/5 contest and will continue to fine-tune the contest turnover file as she does so. She has made a schedule of what needs to be done during the year as well as a file for letters, forms, and so forth. This way her successor will have a much easier time taking over the contest. Terry Albert will be the New Contest Chair in 2005 and will work with Liz this year. Susan McCullough has done the Special Awards for our contest and Kim Thornton will now take over her job.

Jan Mahood will be chairing the 70th Banquet Sponsorships and is asking for volunteers for 2005.

Tonight we have lovely gifts for all attending the banquet from AKC, Westminster Kennel Club, Bowtie, Fancy, Sherpa, Dog Treats, Harper Collins Books, along with our own bookmarks.

Our New Web Editor is Kathy Buetow and she is working on a new server for our site. The new site will allow us more pages. The site should remain at <u>www.dwaa.org</u>

Book Signing: Amy Fernandez gave her report on signings and is planning to try and have a signing at the Southgate next year and perhaps one at the Eukanuba Classic in Florida this year.

Bryna Comsky is our new PR Person. She will be handing out envelopes with the winners for publishers and editors tonight.

The Board will support the CWA/DWAA seminar again this year in Houston, Texas.

Old Business:

The Brainstorming meeting held by the DWAA in Houston was well attended this past year.

The Board has voted to change our Constitution: Section 2 (d). It now reads to promote and support the Dog Writers Educational Trust. *Change will read: to promote and support an Annual Writing Competition*. This will appear in 3 newsletters, one to announce it, the second to discuss the change and the 3rd for a vote of the membership.

New Business:

Janine Adams presented the new Maxwell lapel pins we made for all who have won a Maxwell. They will be given with each Maxwell Award. Those who have won a Maxwell before today can send for one from the Secretary for \$3.50 postage and handling.
