#### Going with the Flow

One of the most difficult tasks I ever did in my writing life also became one of my greatest lessons. I was nearly ready to send a completed book manuscript (for <u>The</u> <u>Perfect Match</u>) in to the publisher, when I mentioned the number of pages to the editor. "Oh, my," she said, "that's way too long. We can't have more than ---- pages." URG. After whining, cajoling and using my best coaxing techniques, I realized she/they were not going to budge. So I gritted my teeth and sat down to "cut my darlings." Sighhhhhhhh. Of course, like every writer, I believe every word I write is a gem. Not just a sparkling Cubic Zirconia wannabe, but a 100 percent gen-u-wine diamond.

How on earth could I cut the book by a third -- from 320 pages to 210? Well, first, I'll admit I cheated a bit. I went through and cut all the white space I possibly could. Instead of putting three lines between subjects, I put two. I decreased the margins to one inch, instead of 1.5 inches. I asked the editor to make the photos of each breed a bit smaller. Then the real work began. I went through and cut every word I could without changing the meaning of sentences. After this, most adjectives and adverbs bit the dust.

I moved several pieces of information to the short breed sketches, which were written in a type of "shorthand" with incomplete sentences. In re-reading all copy, I found things that were witty (I thought so anyway!) but unnecessary to describe the breed. Punchy brevity became my mode and focus. I found all sorts of ways to say the same thing in a shorter manner. It was amazing how quickly the 320 pages became 210. And, when I read the final draft, it was tight and pithy! I liked it. Hmmmm. Was the editor really onto something?

<u>The Perfect Match</u> was published and sells well yet today, but the humorous thing was that any criticism of the book was directed to the brevity of the answers. Read on.

#### **Playing It Smart**

"The greatest discovery of any generation is that a human being can alter his life by altering his attitude." William James

Probably the smartest thing I did when cutting was to create a file called "Darlings." There I steadfastly placed all my jewels. About a year or two later, I received a call from the same publisher, albeit under another firm name (a totally different subject) asking whether I could expand the book....too funny! This was an easy job. Although I did some additional research and solicited different photos, changed the wording to fit this book's style (one of the Dummies series), it was a snap to expand it into a 312-page book, entitled <u>Choosing a Dog for Dummies</u>.

So now I had two books on the same subject: choosing a breed. I worried about them in combat for the same audience, but it didn't happen. Some people prefer the light Dummies style and are willing to pay more for longer descriptions; others want the short in-your-face, no-nonsense breed synopses of the other.

During the angst of the cut, I learned two lessons: 1) When it can be said in fewer words, do it. 2) Never cut and destroy your darlings. File them away for another day. Actually three lessons -3) Sometimes editors are right. (Note to all my editors: just joshing!)

### There's Editing, and Then Editing

Thank heavens, this occurred before the final editing! Successive editings are usually required to be turned around quickly and extensive changes are charged to the author. Some companies send the author two drafts for corrections, changes or additions. Often this consists of reading the text for typos or inconsistencies the author, editor and copy editor have missed. Authors may be asked to clarify passages or recheck statistics or facts. These are usually flagged with tiny Post Its®.

Sometimes meaning is questioned (or even changed by the non-doggy copy editor or editor). Thus, text must be read carefully, as though you were reading it for the first time, rather than the tenth. Sometimes the simple elimination of the word "the" can change the meaning of the whole sentence. Or dropping the 't from the word can't. Once a sentence of mine was changed that could have endangered the life of a dog. At another time, a change could have altered a dog's appearance so that it could not be shown.

The most fun for me was meeting the dogs and their owners, who were more than happy to let us pet the dogs, play with them, and give interviews. They are superstars in the sport of dogs. Kirby the Papillon is the oldest dog to win BIS at Westminster. He was 8 years, now 13. Mick, the Kerry Blue Terrier, is the second dog to win both Westminster and Crufts. The year J.R. won BIS, (2001) he defeated 139,000 dogs. J.R. completed his show career at age 3. He was the only puppy in his litter! He is now 6.

### **DWAA 2003 Writing Contest Regular Categories Nominees**

Congratulations to all nominees! Remember that it will take a while for winners to be posted on the DWAA website (<u>www.dwaa.org</u>), so if you wish to know immediately if you've won but you won't be there, ask someone who is going to be there to call or e-mail you after the banquet.

Each entry in each category is scrutinized by three judges. Each judge scores the entries from 100 (perfect) to 0. The three scores are averaged to come up with one score. The highest scoring entries in each category are the nominees and the highest score is the Maxwell Award winner. The number of nominees depends upon the judges' scores. Any entry that has an over all low score will not be nominated. Nominees are listed in alphabetical order.
