President's Column

By the time you receive this newsletter, your immediate thoughts will be on turkey, holiday shopping, Christmas, Hanukkah, and New Year's. The busiest, most stressful and yet fun times of the year, all wrapped into one giant package.

But that means the clock is ticking on the annual Dog Writers Association of America awards banquet and dinner in New York City Sunday, Feb. 11 and the Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show the following two nights. Nonstop action for most of us.

I want to fill you in on a couple new scenarios and warn you about a couple more. In the past few years several of our members have participated in a book signing at the Southgate Hotel, now Affinia Manhattan on the Saturday before the show.

That meant a sacrifice to these authors - i.e. arrive a day earlier than some might have planned, hence pay an extra night's lodging; give up a good portion of Saturday (the only day for some to play tourist in the Big Apple) to man their tables and hopefully autograph books for buyers. Not only that, but they must lug the books to New York and take the unsold ones back home. As we all know, books aren't light.

Next February's signing is still uncertain at this point because a posting on the DWAA Pro List site attracted very few authors. We would need seven to eight firm commitments to give the event credibility, and at this writing in late October we do not have that many. So stay tuned for an update, which will first be noted on the Pro List site.

Sunday is a full day for most of us. Your board of directors will meet at 10 a.m. in the Affinia Manhattan and the general membership meeting is scheduled to begin at 11 a.m. We need a big turnout for the membership gathering, not only to collect your input on DWAA policy but your ideas for new events or projects in the next year. The meeting is a great site for new members to be introduced and make new friends. That is difficult to do at Sunday night's banquet, since friends often choose to sit together at the same table.

The past several years the American Kennel Club has hosted a media cocktail reception at the hotel beginning at 5 p.m. Because of skyrocketing costs, AKC will be holding the event at its New York headquarters, 260 Madison Ave., fourth floor, from 4:30 p.m.-5:30 p.m. for all DWAA members. You must RSVP by Jan. 26 to Lara Minch-Klass, 212-696-8228, or <u>lmk@akc.org</u>.

For those who might find it difficult to attend the AKC function, the Affinia Manhattan will be offering a no-host bar 5-6 p.m. near the entry to the banquet hall.

Now this brings me to the aforementioned warnings: If you plan to attend, make your reservations NOW for hotel rooms and airlines. Rooms for hotels within walking distance of Madison Square Garden fill up quickly. In fact, many people make their next year's reservation when checking out the previous year. But obviously, it's difficult for most of us to know whether we will be attending the following year.

Your second warning: If you plan to attend the AKC cocktail event, you will need to be back to the Affinia Manhattan to check in for dinner and a name tag by at least 5:45. And if you are nominated for an award, you must realize that the banquet ceremonies will begin at 6 p.m. sharp whether you are there or not. That's because it's a long evening with the presentation of more than five dozen awards, and the hotel staff is assigned to begin putting all entrees out at a specific time. So please leave ample time for catching a cab and getting back to hotel from AKC headquarters.

And here's the third and final warning: In early January or before, finalists in each category and special-awards winners will be notified. If you are one of them and plan to attend the banquet and cover the Westminster show the next two days, make your banquet reservations by then or before. Chances are likely it will be a sellout again. The room holds a maximum of 250 guests; the last two years have been sold out and several unhappy people would not have been able to gain admittance last year, had it not been for the record 26-inch snowstorm Sunday that kept many from reaching New York.

Should you purchase banquet reservations and be confronted with an emergency of some sort in January, notify Secretary Pat Santi and your money will be refunded. She must give the hotel a firm number for meals by Jan. 30 for which DWAA is charged; hence thereafter no refunds can be given. Happy Thanksgiving to everyone!

The AKC "Meet the Authors" event will take place during the Sixth Annual AKC/Eukanuba National Championship on December 2 through 3 in Long Beach, CA. Holiday Warnings for Your Dog

Even though we all know this, it bears repeating at the onset of every holiday season. Any food your pet doesn't get regularly can cause some serious GI upset, and with elderly Aunt Sally's ore-existing distaste of dogs you want to avoid "dire rears." Although diarrhea is annoying, it's not life-threatening as is pancreatitis is, so avoid giving your pets table scraps and excess treats. On Thanksgiving, particularly avoid poultry skin; cooked poultry bones can splinter, possibly causing deadly peritonitis, or create foreign bodies that need to be removed surgically on an emergency basis, giving you a holiday gift that you have to pay off. If you put up a Christmas tree, remember that tinsel is just a tad too appealing, particularly to cats and puppies, and can twist up the intestines (see that emergency surgery you have to pay off). Ditto for ribbons. The much-maligned poinsettia is actually not harmful to your pets, but mistletoe and amaryllis bulbs really are toxic. With poinsettias, the real concern is that it can be irritating to the mouth and skin; toxicity isn't the problem.

A little forethought can prevent a lot of holiday angst!

The Writing of Paws & Reflect

Neil Plakcy and I have been reading and editing each other's work for 20 years. He uses one of my short stories to teach his Creative Writing class at Broward Community College. I've encouraged him through the writing and publication of his "Mahu" series of gay detective novels.

He invited me to give a lecture to his class, which went very well, so we relaxed with margaritas at a restaurant on the Intercoastal Waterway. It was one of those warm, winter Florida afternoons when good ideas float like gardenia petals on the wind.

"We should do a project together," Neil said. "What could we do?"

"You're a gay mystery writer and I'm a dog expert," I mused.

At the same moment, we both said, "Gay men and dogs." It immediately seemed to us a great idea and a natural combination of our talents. We hashed out a proposal for a book that would contain stories about men and their dogs that Neil would solicit from his contacts among gay writers; and interviews with gay dog owners that I knew from my many years as a breeder, exhibitor, judge, and dog writer.

Alyson Books publisher Dale Cunningham signed the book after we convinced her that a combination of writers' stories plus journalist interviews would meld seamlessly together into one book. The only thing we couldn't agree on was what to call this two-headed monster; to me, it was a non-fiction book, to Neil, an anthology. Dale had a third idea; it was a 'collection.' Her idea is the one that went into the publishing catalogues; Neil and I are still arguing about it.

Amazingly, Neil's invitations to 15 writers were all answered. Lev Raphael wrote about the Lhasa Apso who grew up with him in Philadelphia, teaching him to deal with grief and loss. Hal Campbell wrote about the Beagles who have given him stoic inspiration to battle his AIDS infection, showing him bravery unto death. Michael Wallerstein wrote about the piebald Dachshund who seemed so stubborn – until he discovered she was deaf. Jeffrey Ricker wrote about how his love for his dog proved to be the connection he needed to find a human life partner.

In the meantime, my interviews weren't going very well. What does a writer in this age do when searching for interview subjects? Turn to the Internet, of course. The two breed lists in which I participate cover Whippets and Brussels Griffons, but my quest for gay men with dogs ended up on every breed list imaginable. Immediately, responses poured in, from Boxer and Rottweiler and Beagle owners who would love to be interviewed.

Sifting through the possibilities took months. Along the way, my editor at Alyson, Richard Fumosa, kept coming up with ideas. From his contacts, we brought in Charles Busch, playwright of "The Tale of the Allergist's Wife;" Jonathan Caouette, acclaimed documentary filmmaker of "Tarnation;" and Ron Nyswaner, screenwriter of the Oscarnominated film "Philadelphia" that starred Tom Hanks. An Alyson editorial assistant, Anthony LoSasso, introduced me to David Mizejewski, host of "Backyard Habitat" on Animal Planet. I got back in touch with Edward Albee, who I'd interviewed 20 years ago for *Sighthound Review* about his Irish Wolfhounds. He was curmudgeonly but cooperative.

From the fifteen stories Neil had collected, we argued back and forth among ourselves. One writer had written about himself, "gay, gay, gay, gay, gay;" which Neil felt was over the top, but I loved. Another writer's style veered into sexual allusions, which Neil loved and I wanted changed. With compromise, argument, and gnashing of teeth, we worked on the book till we had a manuscript good enough to submit.

We were contracted for 80,000 words. Throughout the months, Neil kept an ongoing word count, and the fear we both had was, "Will we have enough?" So naturally, when we went to turn it in, it ran to over 100,000 words. What to cut? That job fell to our editor. Our 30-story book is now a 25-story book. And here's the good news: I love every one of them. Each story enlightens another corner of the canine-human bond. Each story highlights a different facet of how a dog's unconditional love enriches a human's spirit.

Neil and I both worked on the introduction. The first sentence is mine: "Thousands of years ago, small wolves pulled up beside the campfires of a newly-emerged species, man, and forged a friendship." But the last sentence is Neil's, and I give him "Best Sentence in the Book Award:" *Paws & Reflect* is a celebration of all the dogs we have loved in the past, the dogs we love now, and the dogs of our future, who even now are just waiting for the right moment for us to invite them to join in our lives."
