Rover, Get Off Her Leg!, Pet Etiquette for the Dog Who Pees on Your Rug, Steals the Roast, and Poops in Improper Places, by Darlene Arden, Health Communications Inc., \$14.95, paperback, 204 pages

This short and sweet book is something I'd like to hand out to a number of dog owners with less than angelic dogs (that occasionally

includes myself, by the way). While Darden is known for expertise with small dogs, this book applies to dogs of all sizes. Darden is a certified animal behavior expert. There's some hilarious anecdotes, including dogs and used sanitary hygiene products (the proper apology is given, should the dog who is dragging around said paper products be yours), how to feed a pack, when your dog pulls your arm out of the socket, when your house is one big chew toy, and so on. Chapters include Plumbing Problems, Social Snafus, Bad Table Manners, Personality Problems, Sex and the Dog Owner (what dog breeder hasn't said "virgin bitch" in front of a minister?), and Goodwill on the Go. Presented with a wonderful sense of humor, this book is full of practical advice. Just drop it off anonymously at the homes of ill-behaved dogs so the owners can get to work!

Goodbye, Jake, by Deborah "Bam" Schildkraut, illustrated by Whitney Martin, Operation Outreach-USA Press, \$7.95, paperback, 48 pages This children's book is an excellent one for children who have just lost a dog or are about to. Written at a third grade level, it's about a boy dealing with death for the first time. The dog in question is his grandmother's

red and black greyhound named Jake. I had a good cathartic cry while reading it. The part describing how the boy says good bye to Jake, knowing that the veterinarian will be there that evening to put Jake down, is



particularly well done and will tug at your heart strings. The illustrations are absolutely perfect. A tough topic to deal with, Schildkraut has nonetheless done an outstanding job.



Dorothy is survived by her son Marvon Hadsell, daughter—in-law Gloria, 4 grand children, 16 great grandchildren, and 1 great grandson and her dog Tommy.

Dorothy was a lover of dogs. She has worked as a canine obedience instructor and judge for more than 40 years. She earned a lifetime achievement award with the American Kennel Club in February 2003 as well as many other allocades. She was active member with the Southern California Obedience Council and the Santa Maria Kennel Club. She was also on the board of the obedience committee for the American Kennel Club and served as an AKC delegate for the Sandia Dog Obedience Club in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Dorothy lived a life of compassion and caring for others, always ready with a kind word of encouragement or some gentle guidance.

She will be missed greatly by all her friends and family, but will be remembered by all whose lives she touched. A celebration of Dorothy's life is scheduled for November 10, 2007 at 11:00 am at the First Christian Church, 1550 South College Dr. Santa Maria, CA.

Tom Crowe, Chairman of the Board of MB –F, Inc. passed away October 9, 2007 just three weeks before his 90th birthday.

Born on Halloween in 1917 in Monessen, PA, he traveled a circuitous path into the fancy. Well-known for the Poodles he handled, other breeds also brought him top honors. In 1961 he won the prestigious Ken-L-Ration award as the handler of the Top Winning Dog, Eastern Division of the U.S. (Pekingese, Ch. Bettina's Kow Kow) and in 1962 he was the handler of the first Weimaraner to win the Sporting Group at Westminster (Ch. Val Knight Ranck, whose show record with Crowe stood until recent history).

He felt very strongly that any who participate in the sport in any way – an exhibitor, a club, judge, breeder, etc., should give back to the sport and to their community. He did so in a quiet manner throughout his entire career in dogs. A former Board Member of the NC State Veterinary Medical Foundation, he was involved at the inception of this facility and through

a scholarship program. As a CHF Board Member he was a staunch supporter of the AKC Canine Health Foundation and he received the Foundation's President's Award in 2001. In 1998 he was named the Gaines' Dog Man of the Year and in 2001 was inducted into the Nature's Recipe Hall of Fame.

With the love of his life, Lois, his wife of 64 years by his side he often said, "I've had a great life. Through dogs I've met great friends, traveled to wonderful places, done everything I wanted to do and accomplished everything I wanted to accomplish." Quite simply, he loved the sport, devoted most of his adult life to it, and it's better for having had him. We will miss him greatly.

He is survived by his wife, Lois; daughters, Dorie Crowe and Mrs. Terry White; granddaughters, Mrs. Katy McAdoo, Shannon Greene and Mrs. Brie Porter, and great-grandchildren, Dakotah, Jeffery, Micah and Michaela, Travis, Piper and Wyatt, and a sister, Mrs. Marylou Budd, and nieces Mrs. Pamela Owens and Loretta Griffin.

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Lesser Number of Newspaper Awards

Dear Fellow Writers,

Now that the competition has closed, I would like to express my disappointment with the decreased number of awards for articles and columns published in a newspaper category. I particularly missed the opinion in a newspaper category. If there were too few entries to make this an exciting category, then we are the losers. With all of the dog-related controversies in the news, particularly in regard to legislation, we should not just rely on the Internet to inform readers of pertinent issues. Many dog owners still do not have Internet access or may not trust it. Newspaper columns and articles are an important way to present necessary information on current problems and issues. Newspaper writing is not lucrative, but it is a vital public service. The very foundation of the DWAA was founded on those who wrote for newspapers.

I write a column each week for a central Pennsylvania newspaper that until recently was owned by Ottaway. The editors want opinion columns because they feel there is a reader void in that area. Often I have wanted to write a column on traditional topics such as housebreaking or pet therapy or choosing a puppy. Instead, local news dictates instead that I submit a column on revising kennel regulations or a lawsuit about the value of a French Bulldog. Writing opinions and taking a stand is seldom popular but it is necessary if one is committed to educating responsible dog owners.

Recently I received a nomination from the Bucknell chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union for a letter to the editor I wrote entitled, "Media must do better on animal stories." According to the nominating letter, "Our democracy's survival is dependent on the expressions of an informed, active, and engaged citizenry." I would paraphrase this "dogs' survival depends on informed, active, and engaged dog owners." Please reexamine our role as dog writers with this in mind.

Breathe Deeply

Breathing deeply is one of the most important things we can do to keep our minds mentally alert. Twenty percent of the air we breathe goes to our brain. 60+ adults are notoriously shallow breathers. Practice this breathing exercise as advocated by Dr. Andrew Weil on a daily basis and especially before doing a mental aerobic exercise. You may want to do this sitting with your back straight, lying on your back, or standing or walking.

Exhale completely through the mouth, making an audible sound. Then, close the mouth and inhale quietly through the nose to a count of four. Hold the breath for a count of seven. Next, exhale audibly through the mouth to a count of eight. Repeat for a total of four cycles, then breathe normally.

The speed with which you do the exercise is unimportant. What is important is the ratio of four, seven, eight for inhalation, hold and exhalation.
