Time flies when you're having fun. This month, I thought it would be worthwhile to look at some of the things around us that rarely get noticed. For example, the American Kennel Club, which has been in existence since 1884 as the gold standard registry for purebred dogs. The world's largest registry, it reached its peak in 1992. Since then, registrations have been in a continuous decline. Many explanations have been offered.

Here are some facts:

- ✓ During the ten-year period (1991-2001) the dog population in the US increased by 9 million dogs – a 17% increase.
- ✓ In this decade, the percentage of purebred dogs in the US increased from 57% in 1996 to 64% by 2000.
- Although the number of purebred dogs increased, the number of AKC-registered dogs significantly declined since peaking in 1992.
- ✓ AKC's customer base is built on a diverse structure: AKC supports more than 195,000 individual breeders, 5,000 clubs, and 21,000 events that annually attract in excess of 1 million exhibitors, vendors, and spectators.

While these numbers are impressive, if we drill down into them, other important concerns can be noticed. For example, although the number of entries in 2007 increased slightly (3 million dogs at all venues) the number of unique exhibitors is declining. In other words, the increase in entries is attributed to the fact that fewer exhibitors are entering their dogs more often.

Other facts help us understand this problem:

- Dog registrations have declined every year since 1996. The decline is worsening, with dog registrations down 7% in 2007 and 11% YTD 2008.
- ✓ AKC litter registrations peaked in 1997 at 564,962 then declined every year since.
- ✓ In 2007, AKC registered less than 400,000 litters for the first time since 1980.
- \checkmark Terrier registrations are the lowest of the seven groups.
- ✓ Herding registrations declined 21% from 1997-1999; Hounds declined 18% from 2000-2002; both groups continue a modest average yearly decline of 4%.

- ✓ Working Group and Non-Sporting breeds have fallen more drastically than the other groups, both down 52% since 1996.
- ✓ Toy breeds, after rising 16% from 1995 to 1998, have declined 30% since peaking in 1998.

It is clear that there are many factors affecting the decline of dog registrations. The two graphs presented show the seriousness of the downward trend. The causes are many and varied. At the top of the list are the 31 competing registries that now offer financial incentives to cost-conscious puppy buyers. The cost of a registration at a competing registry is often free or included in the purchase price. Dennis Sprung, president of AKC, reported that AKC receives more than 400 inquiries per week from dog owners with "papers" from other organizations wanting to know if they can still register their dog with AKC. The competing registries have developed a business model that has shifted Americans away from the AKC and into retail stores.

Other factors driving down registrations are limited registrations. Each year about 200,000 pups are sold on limited registrations. That means they cannot be bred or entered in shows. A little math shows that $100,000 \times 100$ years = 1 million lost from the stud book, the gene pools of breeds and memberships, many of which might have become new owners and participants in the sport. Originally, limited registrations were to be used for pups with defects and not breedable.

All successful companies review their business strategy, customer base, core business, and market conditions. Successful ones pay close attention to trends. The question before the house is what to do.

This problem raises two fundamental questions:

- 1. Whose AKC dogs will be registered?
- 2. Will all AKC breeders be welcomed?

Many express opinions about puppy registrations from pet stores and backyard breeders. That raises an important question. It is called choice and who gets to choose. Should all AKC-registrable pups be registered? If breeders continue limiting registrations on most pups it might not matter. The decline will also affect the AKC and its ability to influence legislation and opinion.

I hope this short review into one important aspect of the dog world is informative and challenging enough to cause some writers to research this subject more and drill down into other important aspects of the problem.

Finally, mark your calendar for the annual meeting and the awards banquet: February 8, 2009, Affinia Manhattan Hotel, New York City.

Secretary's Page

DWAA Voting Process

I encourage all members to vote. As you will see by the ballot several candidates are running this year. All eligible members will be mailed a ballot. The process follows the bylaws.

According to the Bylaws of the DWAA:

Article V Section (c), (d), (e)

"Any member in good standing may petition to run for a specific office if he sends to the Secretary, before November 1, a petition signed by ten (10) members in good standing. (adopted 1997)

On or about December 1, the Secretary will mail a ballot to each member in good standing, The ballots will be delivered unopened to the Annual Meeting where three (3) tellers appointed by the President will count them. All Ballots received by the Secretary (Lock Box) no later than December 31 will be counted.

Because the Secretary is running for her office a lock box has been secured and all ballots will be sent to the locked box instead of the Secretary's home address. This is keeping with the bylaws.

You will receive a large #10 envelope that is addressed to you (if your dues are paid and you are a voting member) Inside that #10 envelope will be a #6 envelope that is stamped ballot and another #10 envelope addressed to the P.O. Box.

The ballot has a mark on it that cannot be copied.

Place the ballot in the #6 (small envelope and then in the #10 (large envelope) and stamp and send to the P. O. Box. after you have marked your votes.

You vote for one (1) person per office as in: President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary

You vote for two (2) Board Members

For the first time since I chaired this contest, I had more volunteers to judge the contest than needed, so a few volunteers weren't used. Please feel free to volunteer again next year - the new contest chair will need help again. Judges came from all walks of life. We had many DWAA and CWA members, but also several AKC judges, several veterinarians, a few physicians, several college writing teachers and professors (they were tough judges but added good critiques), several newspaper editors and reporters, members of the Society of Professional Journalists, members of The Author's Guild, members of a San Diego Editing organization, and more.

Thanks go to the ASPCA (Thanks Marion!) for providing the judges' gifts - either a glow in the dark leash for walking your dog after dark or an ASPCA tote bag. Thanks again, Marion.

Many judges added comments about the scores they gave and in the newsletter following the banquet, I'll share many of those comments, which will be quite educational.

The nomination list for the Special Awards will be published in the December issue of our newsletter. The list of winners will be published in the first newsletter after the banquet.

Thanks again to everyone who entered the contest and to all our judges. Your hard work and efforts are always appreciated. If anyone would like to take on the job of contest chairperson next year – I only agreed to do this one year this time around – feel free to contact me and I'll give you an idea of what's involved. *Liz Palika*


