

As many of you already know, long-time DWAA member Robert H. McKowen passed away on Tuesday, December 15, 2015.

Bob organized the AKC performance division and, because of his efforts, Agility was approved as an AKC titled sport and Earth Dog was approved as an AKC titled event.

Bob served as AKC Vice president and was also AKC Vice President of Performance Events for eight years, and Field Representative for Lure Coursing. He was active with the Eastern and National German Shorthaired Pointer Clubs of America.

He devoted his life to the sport as a breeder, exhibitor, judge, club officer, delegate, writer and author. In his capacity as an author he wrote the breed book for the German Shorthaired Pointer and bred and owned the top producing GSP in the history of the breed.

Bob was also generous with his time to DWAA and served as a long-time member of the Board of Governors.

Bob was elected to the Hall of Fame this year and I am glad to say we were able to notify him of this honor before his passing. His son told me he was very proud of his work with the DWAA and extremely pleased to be elected to the Hall of Fame.



Bob's family very generously requested that donations be made to the DWAA in lieu of flowers and, because of this kindness, we will be offering the Robert H. McKowen memorial special award for Friends of Rescue.


Kathleen Mueller

Kathleen "K2" Mueller has always had a pack of dogs and cats along for the journey, and most of them have lived well into their senior years. She enjoys parenting multiple dogs and cats, especially those who are elderly or have special needs. Her dogs, Timba, Hobie and Hector were the inspiration for her blog, k2k9.com.

As chief financial officer of Passports Educational Travel; and president of its sister corporation, Studiowner, she has been known to bring a dog or two with her during long shifts at the office. During her brief stint at the famous Long View Farm residential recording studio (the predecessor to Studiowner), she was responsible for caring for the farm's 28 cats and a pack of several loyal, beloved dogs.

Friends and family often turn to K2 for advice about dogs. They call her when a pet falls ill or has crossed the Rainbow Bridge, they call to get assistance in re-homing a dog in need of a new family, or they call to announce that they've adopted a new dog. She's always ready to lend a sympathetic ear, provide tips and advice, or network with local shelters and rescues to get help for humans and their pets.

A few years ago, she adopted two puppies who had been rescued from a Tennessee high-kill shelter and brought to New England. She adopted Charlie Brown first, at just 10 weeks of age. Seven months later, his brother, Cooper, was returned to the rescue agency with a broken leg that required amputation. Upon hearing that the young, disabled dog needed a new family, K2 helped raise funds for the



operation, then promptly adopted him.

A member of Blog Paws' influencer network, she is a regular blog contributor for Fairy DogParents and Doggy Loot; has volunteered for several organizations including Fairy DogParents and Great Dane Rescue of New England; wrote for examiner.com as the Worcester (Mass.) Pets Examiner; was Family and Pets reporter for CBS Local Boston; and was a board member of the Eastham (Mass.) Dog Owners' Association.

Recently, she took a break from writing and volunteering to care for the two loves of her life: her partner, Gil, who had terminal cancer, and their beloved senior Lab/Shepherd mix, Hobie. Sadly, they both died in 2015.

Under the supervision of rescue dogs Charlie Brown and Cooper (and cats Cali, Tux and Newman) she is back at work completing a three-volume series of excerpts from her father's WWII letters, "More Than Anything In The World." Coming soon: a collection of essays about her many dogs and cats; a biography of her life-partner, Dr. Gil Markle; and a book about the American educational group tour industry.





Backtracking a bit: In my last column, I shared some of Danny's past with you. He has certainly blossomed since he realized he was in a safe forever home with us. That said, he does have some insecurities regarding me. If my husband and I go out and my husband comes back without me, Danny will actually become ill. He worries something happened to me just as it did to his previous owner. Good thing I don't plan on taking any trips! This has not affected our work as Town Watch volunteers or even our normal everyday lives to any great degree. I do try not to do anything that might make Danny anxious such as leaving him with a stranger while I am out of sight.

Our latest adventure: I recently learned Danny apparently knows he has a job to do when we are out walking. Hard to believe but he seems to have caught onto the idea he is now a working dog.

After I shared our latest adventure on the DWAA Yahoo chat list, I was asked to share it with the readers of ruffDRAFTS, too. Danny certainly showed me he knows more than I thought he did!

Danny usually picks our route on the second walk of the day. Our long walk is usually the first walk early in the morning. The later one is taken after I shower but before lunch so Danny tends to make that one a shorter walk. Lunch is very important to a hard-working Setter (smile). He often heads down our street, onto the next block, around the corner and over to the school's street or up the block behind ours. This day, he wanted to turn up the side street a block down and one over from our street. It is a

nice little street, quiet with one-way traffic. It is a narrow, tree-lined street, too. I mention these facts to give you an idea of the situation and general area.

We had only walked a few feet when I saw a man lying on the ground beside his automobile. As I mentioned, this is a quiet street so I thought at first he was just working on something under the car - maybe something came loose. But, then, something told me (Danny's ESP to me?) that the man was in trouble. I asked him if he needed help and he said he did. He had fallen trying to get into his car and could not get up. The seat of the car was low and he had the "Club" on the steering wheel so the wheel was too far down towards the seat. These factors gave him little room to squeeze into the car. Danny and I hurried across the street to his side. Fortunately, a man who had just come out of the little store on the corner saw what was happening and rushed over to help too. Just as we were doing this, a Fed Ex truck driver turned his vehicle into the street. He stopped and got out to aide us.

The man refused our urging to let us call 911 for him. We did our best to ascertain he had not broken any bones and the three of us were able to move him to a sitting position beside his car. The Fed Ex truck blocked anyone from turning down the street and hitting us.

Before I could help the man, though, I had to put Danny someplace where he would be safe. I hooked his leash to the railing of the house where the car was parked. That meant Danny could not see me because the car blocked his view. Add to this setup a cute little cat who was watching the whole scenario. She was not about to leave the entertainment the humans were providing. Danny loves cats. We have five of them. If we see one when we are walking, he will cry hoping the cat will come say "hello" to him. A combination of stresses for my rescued dog who had some insecurities. Or, so I thought. Danny was the perfect good citizen. He seemed to

know this was a serious situation. Even though he could not see me, he never whined or barked. He saw the cat but did not try to get to her or whine for her to come to him and she was sitting a short distance from him. He stood in place and waited for me. This was such a big deal to me because I learned my dog had overcome his past and was perfect for this job I had chosen for us . . . Town Watch!

Meanwhile, back to the man on the ground: The two men with me helped him stand. He explained he and his wife had some very serious health issues. In fact, he was on his way to dialysis. I made him promise he would sit in the automobile until he felt calm and well enough to drive. He did seem to recover once he stood up.

This is a street that has a block captain and people who take care of one another. I notified my friend who lived up the block a few houses so he could let the block captain know. They will watch out for this man. Perhaps they can convince him to take advantage of the transportation services available to people in need of medical assistance.


I should mention that Danny was never in any danger even though he could not see me. I was only a short distance away from him and I carry pepper spray so if anyone had threatened him, I could have been at his side instantly. I would never risk my dog's safety for anyone.

The humorous part of this was when I saw the cat walk away after all the excitement was over. She really did enjoy our "show" it seemed.

As I've said before: always listen to your inner voice. In this case, I think it was my dog telling me we had to take this particular route because someone was in trouble. Danny did more than is required for the "owner out of sight" part of the Canine Good Citizen test. That day I learned my dog knows more than I realized and I can trust him to know what to do in a serious situation.

He made me so proud!






