Bobbie, The Wonder Dog

It is not often that we experience a "feel good" story. When we do, however, we want to share it. In the search of a refreshing and uplifting narrative, some of our members vacationed in scenic Oregon recently. The draw of this trip was the 100th anniversary of "Bobbie, the Wonder Dog". The seemingly unbelievable story of Bobbie drew our attention to a little town of Silverton in Oregon. Bobbie was a Scotch collie with a bobbed tail, a wide blaze and unique

markings. Of course, the lure of a story about an amazing collie sweetened the pot. With a population of 10,300, and roughly an hour's drive south of Portland, this oasis named Silverton was a mecca of beauty: with flowering trees, shrubs, and colorful flowers that

almost overload the senses, and there was exquisiteness at every turn on the winding roads and hills that make up this beautiful town.

Founded in 1854, few people settled in this unique spot. Known as the town that no one goes through to get to any other town or city, you have to intend to travel there. Currently, with 10,300 people living in Silverton, you experience a friendliness that makes you feel at home. Totally self-contained, the town offers every type of shop that one could need for every-day living. It boasts of having a total of three stop lights and the downtown area is full of wonderful shops and restaurants. We were drawn into this town which also boasts large painted murals that depict important historic events important to the residents.

In 1923 one of the families that lived in Silverton was the Brazier family. Having moved from a rural area into town, the Braziers opened

a restaurant. Bobbie was originally sold to the new owner of the Brazier farm but he was unhappy without his family. Having the innate intelligence and loyalty that collies have, he kept escaping the farm and finding his way into town to locate his family. The Braziers finally gave up and bought him back from the farmer for three times what the farmer paid for him.


In August of 1923, the Braziers decided to undertake a long and arduous journey via auto-

mobile to Wolcott.Indiana to visit family. Travel in those days was not without difficulty as roads were often treacherous, but they safely arrived. However, upon arriving in Indiana. Bobbie was attacked and run off by a pack of local dogs. Each time Bobbie tried to rejoin his family, the mean pack would run him off again. The Brazier

family desperately tried to find Bobbie and extended their stay to find him. After quite some time, they sadly finally had to give up hope and return to Silverton. The family was devastated.

What happened next was an amazing tale. Almost six months to the exact day of being left behind and in February 1924, Bobbie arrived in Silverton. Injured and matted, with his pads cracked and severely damaged, Bobbie found his way to his home. This family rejoiced! Talk about the original Lassie Come Home Story! They could not believe their good fortune in once again having their faithful friend back home. News of Bobbie's story spread like wildfire. Remember, these were the days of no internet, television, and limited radio. The local newspaper ran articles of this wonderful feat and soon national magazines and newspapers covered the story in these days of no social media and internet. Accounts of Bobbie's travels of







over 2,500 miles spread nationwide, and confirmed sightings of this uniquely marked dog were verified and substantiated. He even returned home with the remnants of a rope around his neck that he chewed through to continue on with his mission that someone who wrote in had the other end of. Bobbie became a celebrity and received hundreds of letters from famous organizations and people such as the National Geographic and author Albert Payson Terhune. These letters allowed the newspaper to track Bobbie's return trip. It is a wonder how

he managed to cross mountain ridges and rivers, but this is a tribute to the loyalty and steadfastness of the collie breed. People traveled to Silverton just to meet this marvel of a dog that traveled such a great distance and survived perils to make his way home to his beloved family. One of his personal appearances attracted 40,000 people! Ripley's Believe It or Not publicized his travels. In 1924, a silent movie, The Call of the West, was made chronicling Bobbie's

amazing trip starring the amazing dog himself. Later, he went on to sire a litter of 15 (all male) puppies. Sadly, Bobbie passed away in 1927 and is buried in a beautiful honored gravesite on the grounds of the Oregon Pet Shelter in Portland. What follows after Bobbie's death is a wonderful tribute to his story. Each year, the town of Silverton honors the love of pets and their families in an annual parade on the third Saturday in May. Labeled simply as the "Pet Parade", thousands of people gather to celebrate their love of their beloved pets each year. Begun in 1932 and

led by Bobbie's son Pal, families and/or their children march with their beloved pets whether they are dogs, cats, rabbits, llamas, and iguanas, whatever the species. From Sapphire the pullet to Toby the pony, every species is celebrated by their loving families. It seems like every organization in town is represented—from the fire truck that starts the parade, to the high school marching band, to churches and local businesses, everyone is represented and welcome. Children watching the parade sit on the curbs anxiously grabbing candy thrown their way.

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

Welcome to summer!

For many, it will be sweltering, so keep everyone in your household (skinny and furry alike) well hydrated. As you know, dogs cool themselves through panting by evaporating the saliva in their mouths and across their tongues. Therefore, sufficient intake of water is essential for this process!

Some tricks to help your dogs drink if they are not so inclined:

- Keep your dog's water bowl clean.
- Pour some unsalted broth into your collie's water bowl (wash the bowl daily at least)
- Put water bowls throughout your house and yard
- Get a bigger dog bowl
- Make doggy ice pops: frozen yogurt, almond milk, broth, smoothie ingredients, etc. in silicone molds or small

paper cups

- Make a smoothie for your dog: green leafies, strawberries, apples, blended with water, almond milk, or broth
- Try a dog drinking fountain
- Try giving water-laden treats: cucumbers, zucchini, celery, and fruits like apples, melons, and blueberries

Signs of a hot dog:

- Heavy panting
- Long, spatulate tongue
- Bright red gums
- Mustard and pickle relish but no ketchup!

Some signs of dehydration in your dog:

- Sticky gums
- Thick, ropey saliva
- Loss of appetite
- Lethargy
- Heavy panting
- Increased heart rate



I live in a semi-rural town close to Stanford University in Northern California. There is no commercial enterprise allowed here, houses are widely spaced with lots of open areas between. In addition, there are a few nature preserves within the town limits. As you all have heard, we had an overabundance of rain through the winter months, resulting in a huge growth of vegetation, especially in those open areas. In many places the wild grasses are 3-4 feet high. While the rains were very welcome in our water-starved state, the superbloom of vegetation will become a grave fire hazard once the summer heat arrives. Therefore, it was interesting to read in our local paper that 445 goats have been clearing the grass in these open areas, accompanied by human and dog herders. While I don't think any collies have been employed, I am sure they could do the job of keeping the goats where they need to be. Any volunteers?



Meet Our New Members!!



Susan Klein has wonderful news!! "Since you last heard from us in the Fall 2022 Collie Connection, Beltane has been slowing down, but still wanting to play the game. He earned 8 more scentwork related titles, including the C-WAGS Ranger Level 3 and Super Sleuth (Level 4) and the CPE Level 2 title. But the big achievement was acquired on what I planned as his official retirement outing. He needed just one last AKC Master Exterior leg to complete his Scentwork Master Elite title. (With the exception of the Detective title, this is probably the most difficult AKC Scent-Work title to earn, requiring 10 legs in each of the 4 Master elements.) Knowing that his would be his last outing, I knew that if he didn't qualify, he would be retired one qualifying score short of the title. It would have been heartbreaking to retire him just short of that title, but I've done it before and was ready to do it again. (I'd already retired him from tracking, agility, and herding just short of a goal.) 


Ear Fiasco

Well, yesterday I noticed that Jib's ears were pricking again. The Tear Mender is either losing its effectiveness or it's losing its effectiveness. Since the puppy has a bit of nude skin in his ears, I thought, OK, I'll use Nu-Hope this time to glue his ears over, thus preventing the Siberian husky dog look and making his ears look pretty and perky.



I get out the Nu-Hope. I put Jibby on the grooming table. I remove the remnants of Tear Mender with Detachol, clean the Detachol off his ears, wipe them with alcohol, and unscrew the Nu-Hope bottle. 
swinging in the dark as he ran away from my collies and my house.



After a few tense minutes, two of us managed to move the sheep into a nearby barn and haul out the misbehaving dogs. It was only then that I was able to turn my

attention to Jamie, who was sitting calmly where I had left him! This melee had occurred all around him, yet he still remembered and adhered to his core obedience training. Indeed, this training can be a life-saver!

Another favorite memory with Jamie occurred when he was just a youngster. We were walking in a local park one day when a group of kids came running and yelling up behind us. Jamie whirled around and hid behind me, and I knew I had my work cut out to conquer his new fear of children. Fortunately, our then-7-year-old neighbor boy came over one day to meet my dogs (we had 3 at the time, with Jamie the youngest at 14 mos.). Jamie took one look at Matt and ran to the farthest end of the yard and hid in a bush until Matt left! After that day, I was better prepared. 
And finally, there's Banner. Two events stand out in my



ran over to put himself between her and Alex, letting her bump into him again and again. He was pretty happy with himself for "saving" her.



[No idea what they were watching I] Instead of grabbing my camera and getting the perfect shot, I grabbed Snowball and stuffed her back into her hamster ball. The look Jackson gave me was...What are you doing? Do you know how long it took me to get her out of that ball?
